### Overview

The National Sports Center for the Disabled (NSCD) provides therapeutic, adaptive sports and recreational programs for people with disabilities of any age and any ability.

### By the Numbers

- 1970 – The NSCD was founded
- 3,000 – The NSCD helps this many children and adults with disabilities each year
- 36 specially trained staff
- 1,300 volunteers from around the state
- 2,100 square-foot adaptive equipment lab in Winter Park
- 15 percent of the NSCD's revenue is from participant fees
- 85 percent of its revenue comes from philanthropic gifts, grants, events, and sponsorships
- 200+ scholarships are given each year to the NSCD participants
- 6 countries are represented by athletes in the NSCD Competition Center (USA, Australia, Iceland, New Zealand, and Great Britain)
- 34 athletes competing in the upcoming Paralympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia, trained at the NSCD
- 48% of the USA Paralympic Delegation from Alpine, Snowboarding, and Nordic/Biathlon disciplines trained at the NSCD

### Facts at a Glance

- The National Sports Center for the Disabled (NSCD) began as a one-time ski lesson for children amputees for the Children's Hospital of Denver.
- Today, the NSCD is one of the largest outdoor therapeutic recreation agencies in the world.
- The NSCD has facilities in Winter Park Resort and at Sports Authority Field at Mile High.
